Lenten Cross—

During the season of Lent families will have the opportunity to take Lenten devotions to do together. You may also sign up for a Lenten cross. Like an advent wreath, the cross will lay on a table and have candles that are to be lit for each week during lent. The middle candle, a white candle, is to be lit on Easter to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. Sign-ups will begin February 26. Crosses will be available on Ash Wednesday.

Reverse Lent: A Different Kind of Fast—

For a different type of family devotion do a different kind of fast. Each week there will be a reading, some discussion questions, an action and a prayer. The actions of the Reverse Lent help the individuals focus on God and others during the season of Lent. Actions include gathering food items, water bottles, school supplies, gently used clothing, and creating personal care kits. Each week or at the end of the season, bring your items to church and place them on the "hill to the cross" remembering Jesus' sacrifice for us. Organizations that will receive the items collected are: The Salvation Army in Caldwell, Lutheran World Relief, Boise Rescue Mission, Love INC, and Washington Elementary. "This is the kind of fast day I'm after: to break the chains of injustice, get rid of exploitation in the workplace, free the oppressed, cancel debts.

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"The Last Enemy Still Brings Pain – But Not Forever!"

"For [Jesus] must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet.

The last enemy to be destroyed is death." (1 Corinthians 15:25-26)

On Ash Wednesday, March 1, Lent 2017 officially begins. Once again we make our journey with Jesus as He walks to Jerusalem fully knowing that He will die on a cross on Good Friday. Even though He knew Good Friday would be followed by Resurrection Sunday, Jesus did not *want* to die. He knew He had to die. It was the will of His Father that He complete the mission of our salvation. But Gethsemane speaks clearly. He didn't want to die.

And neither do we. As we make our way through this life we all know that death awaits us at some time. One day we will draw our last breath. And even though we know that Resurrection Day awaits us, we don't *want* to die. Probably for different reasons than Jesus. But nonetheless, none of us *want* to die.

It isn't only Lent that reminds us of death. In less than two months this winter we said farewell to five members of our Church family. Each death, each funeral, each graveside committal is a reminder that death continues to stalk its victims.

And victims we are. As Paul declares, death remains our enemy until the day Jesus returns to put an end to its tyranny. But that day has not come yet as our "last enemy" continues to claim our loved ones.

A few months ago my Mom shared the article below with me. It was written by a retired RN who is a member of her congregation and was published in their church newsletter. Though she still mourns my Dad's and brother's death Mom found this woman's words helpful and comforting.



What is it about death that seems so devastatingly final? Didn't God tell us from the days of the Garden of Eden we would die? Death is as sure to follow birth as a sunset follows the sunrise.

The last 10 years of my nursing career I worked as a Hospice Nurse. Not a day passed that I didn't think about death and dying. The experience did serve to deepen my faith and trust in God even as I was reminded each day that nobody escapes death.

Some deaths certainly appeared worse to me than others. Watching a person struggling to live is difficult to witness. While we all hope that God, in His supreme kindness, will allow us to die in our sleep, the chances of that happening are actually pretty slim. Our bodies are programmed to live. And as they are dying, most people struggle as they stave off death.

Witnessing a death is often filled with inexplicable sadness and helplessness. But I've come to believe there is more happening during this process than we are able to witness. I have

experienced enough of people in the end stages of life to believe that God does not abandon us as we die. He is present in the midst of this struggle, and it is Him who gives both peace and comfort, both to the one dying and to me.

When a person dies, I honestly trust that God has His hand in the process. He understands that death frightens us so He does not abandon us. An image that has helped me immensely is to think of death as a person sailing away and over the horizon. We will not see them again this side of heaven. But that person has not disappeared. They have simply moved beyond our view. Yes, the earthly body is left behind. But the person we just "lost" is not lost. They are home, reunited with God.

So if Dad's soul has gone home, why should that devastate me so? Yes, I am left to weep and mourn. I will miss Dad's physical presence so very much. And I ask, "Am I wrong to be so selfish?" I don't think so. God created us, even our strong emotions. It is impossible to live life as if our loved one never existed.

So as I dig deeper and cling to my Christian faith, while I miss my dad, I know I can rejoice for him – even in death. HE is the lucky one. And one day, I will be the lucky one, as well. I, too, will draw my last breath here on earth and get to enter the loving arms of my Lord.

Maybe we can think of our birth as a round trip ticket. The first half of our journey begins as we draw our first breath here. We never know when we've begun the trip back. We just know that someday we WILL return to our true home. In the meantime we trust, love and praise our God as we strive to do His will.



While our death is certain, as God's people we are never without hope. This side of heaven the last enemy still brings pain – but not forever! Jesus **will** return and death, weeping, mourning and tears will be no more.

With every funeral I attend or conduct, Jesus' words in John 11:25-26 become sweeter and sweeter:

"I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die."

My Funeral Plans - Not Afraid of Death

Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting? The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." 1 Corinthians 15:54-57

As God's people we know that Jesus' Easter victory assures us of our own victory over death and the grave. The fact that each of us will face death means we have a great opportunity to express our faith in a positive way at the time of, and even after, we die. The confidence with which we face the difficult subject of death speaks volumes about our confidence in the Lord who has conquered death and the grave for us.

One way we can do this to make our wishes about our funeral or memorial service known to our loved ones before we die. And we have an easy way for you to do this.

In the magazine rack on the right side of the mailboxes you will find sheets titled: *My Funeral Plan*. You are invited to pick up as many as you might need, fill them out and then tell your family where they can be found in the event of your death. You can even bring them to the church and we will file them for you here (Hint: don't place them in a safety deposit box because that can often be inaccessible until various legalities are taken care of, usually after the time of the funeral).

Consider these blessings if you do this:

- You help your family know that the hymns, Bible verses and other details of your funeral are what you want.
- You have the opportunity to speak with them not just about plans for your funeral but also about the
 joy that is yours because you know that, in Christ, your future is secure.
- You can speak to those who will attend that service about the sure and certain hope that is yours because of your faith in Jesus Christ.

Lenten Theme, Holy Week and Easter Schedule

You are probably aware that this year marks the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. On October 31, 1517, a Roman Catholic monk named Martin Luther posted 95 Theses for debate and discussion on the chapel door in Wittenberg, Germany. Little did he know that this would begin a process that would profoundly affect his world and ours.

Luther believed Lent was an ideal time to teach the Christian faith. This year we are going to take his advice in our Midweek Lenten Services to do this under the theme *The Art of Living by Faith*. With the exception of Ash Wednesday and Holy Week, we will gather on Wednesday evening for a light supper at 5:30 pm, Hymn sing in the sanctuary at 6:15 pm and Worship from 6:30-7:15 pm.

I pray you will be able to join us this Lent as we make our way with Jesus to the cross of Good Friday and the empty tomb of Easter.

A feel-good story in the spirit of *The Unlikely* Pilgrimage of Harold Fry and Major Pettigrew's Last Stand, Fredrik Backman's novel about the angry old man next door is a thoughtful exploration of the profound impact one life has on countless others. 

4 Year Old Class

This is our class motto. We created it last summer partly for the new website, but more importantly to sum up what we do. We're proud to teach children about God's word, and His promise that He is always with us. We Praise God for adding to our Preschool family. Our new student, Maylee, puts the Pre-k class total to 26. Thankfully we have morning and afternoon sessions.

We've been focusing on: John the Baptist - Whoever believes will be saved. Mark 16:16; Jesus' baptism - This is my Son that I love. Matt. 3:17; the disciples - I will make you fishers of men. Matt. 4:19; and the Lord's Prayer. We'll finish learning the uppercase letters and will focus on lower case letters. Some of our students are beginning to sound out and read short words that end in: ad, am, an, ap, ar, at. We start with very simple words they can sound out phonetically; as they progress we move forward with new words. It's very exciting for them to be able to sound out letters, make a word and read with confidence.

The students are grasping math concepts. We've been working on sequencing, correct order, categorizing, adding and subtracting. These are building blocks for moving forward. They've also been learning more/fewer, far/near, and same/opposite. Our crafts integrate the letters and Bible stories we're learning. The rug games are a highlight and have greatly improved their hand-eye coordination. We're having a great time learning new songs and dancing in the classroom.
