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# **GRACE LUTHERAN CHURCH PARKING GARAGE**

"Remember that at that time you were separate from Christ...without hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ." Eph. 2:12-13

Have you ever lost something very, very precious to you? Janet and I have.

We were taking our youth group from South Dakota to meet another youth group at a church in Minnesota where a close friend was the pastor. One of the things we did with them was to go to the Science Museum of Minnesota in St. Paul.

We had our own three children with us (ages 3, 7 & 9) and when we got to the museum everyone but the other pastor and I went in while we went to the parking garage to park. But Lucas had stayed in the van, probably because he was having fun in the big car. Janet assumed I'd see him...but I didn't.

When I went into the museum and walked up to Janet she said, "Where's Lucas?" And I said, "He's with you." And she said, "No he's not!"

We ran back to the parking garage hoping he was locked in the car but...no Lucas! He must have slipped out right behind me and I didn't see him. We started calling his name and desperately looking around...and still no Lucas! It seemed like eternity but was probably only a few moments before a group of people came by and asked if we were looking for a little boy in a red shirt. Another group had found him wandering and taken him into the museum to contact someone who could help reunite him with his parents.

We ran back to the museum and, by the grace of God and the kindness of strangers, there was Lucas, sitting on the counter surrounded by friendly faces. Unless something like this has happened to you, you can't begin to imagine the relief we felt as Janet held Lucas and wept tears of relief.

As hard as that was for us, it can't begin to compare with the pain and sorrow our God felt when Adam and Eve sinned. They, and we, were <u>truly</u> separated from Him and destined to remain so...forever. That's what Paul refers to in the verse at the top of this page, Because of sin Adam and Eve and all their descendants were "*separated from Christ…without hope and without God in the world.*"

But, in His infinite mercy, God had a plan to bring us back to Himself. And our reconciliation with God came with a huge price. God's one and only Son gave Himself up, suffered and died on the cross. And when He cried out, "*My God, My God, why have you forsaken me*?" He was experiencing the hell that was to be our destiny.

But it's not our destiny anymore! We were once lost but "Now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ."

What joy to know that, in this life, we have a God

who is always with us, watching over us, taking care of us. What a relief to know that there is now nothing that can "*separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.*" Romans 8:39 What a hope we have as we look forward to the end of all the pain and death of this world when Jesus returns to take us home.

But not everyone has that same joy, relief or hope. Think about it...as you walk down the streets of our city you are seeing the faces of people who are still "*separated from Christ...without hope and without God in the world.*" No hope because they do not know Jesus.

And that's why we're here. Those people are why you and I were left here when we were baptized. We're here to provide opportunities and pathways to introduce others to Jesus.

Quite honestly, this is the one reason I am so excited about the possibility of starting an Early Learning Center. I believe many of the people who will take advantage of the all-day care and preschool education for their children at our ELC need Jesus, too.

Our Early Learning Center here in Caldwell will be like that parking garage in St. Paul. It will be the place where lost people will, by the grace of God and the kindness of strangers (that's you and me), be introduced to their loving Savior and God.

Can you imagine the joy God will have for each lost soul that is found? We have been given the opportunity to provide a place where we will meet a bunch of people we would never meet anywhere else, people with whom God would have us share the joy, relief and hope He has given to us through His Son.

If we embrace this ministry, our Early Learning Center will be the place where:

- little ones will be taught about Jesus and loved by their Christian teachers for hours every day;
- the families of those little ones will get to know us as we provide natural opportunities to gather together;
- these same families will have a place to turn when they experience the brokenness that comes from living in a broken world.

But this will only happen if we embrace the challenge of beginning that Early Learning Center.

What price are we willing to pay for this opportunity? What is the price of one soul who comes to faith because we were willing to step out in faith? Only God knows the true worth of a human soul. For Him, it was worth the life of His Son. What is it worth to us? See you in church,

# The importance of a united front

My wife and I disagree about our daughter, and it's affecting my daughter's attitude. I'll say she can't go somewhere until she finishes homework, then her mother lets her go. I'll take her phone; her mom will give it back. It's making my daughter hate me. What can I do?

You have to convince your wife that a united front is in everyone's best interest. Otherwise, it will damage the family and turn your daughter into a certified princess (not the good kind).

Parents need to agree on the right course of action for their children, and once a decision is made, both should support it totally. That's what it means to put forth a united front, and it's essential in helping children grow into thriving, high-character adults.

As any parent should know, a big part of the job is ensuring that kids don't always get everything they want. This helps them distinguish right from wrong, teaches them to respect boundaries, keeps them safe, and instills self-discipline. It also helps prevent them from becoming spoiled brats.

So continually issuing split decisions is one of the worst things parents can do. Suppose Dad tells his daughter her shorts are too short, then Mom says they aren't. Or suppose a parent decrees "two weeks without a phone," and the other parent slips it back the next day. These situations teach kids that there are no roadblocks to getting their way; there are only speed bumps and detours— or, worse, mean people and useful people.

But suppose Dad says, "You can't go out tonight." Then the daughter turns to Mom, who says, "If your Dad says you can't, then you can't." This may trigger a useless tantrum, but in the long run, it teaches the child to adapt to inconveniences. It shows her that no means no.

Putting forth a united front requires pre-parenting. You have to discuss rules and boundaries before there's a crisis, not make things up individually as you go.

And if you can't agree on the boundaries, you must at least agree to back each other up. If mom says no, then dad needs to say no, too, no matter how crazy he thinks mom's decision is. This will teach the child that rules actually apply to her, and she can't just run to another authority figure to obtain a more desirable decision.

There are lots of reasons parents fail to put forth a united front. Sometimes they legitimately disagree on the course of action. In that case, they must compromise, like adults are supposed to do.

Often the reason one parent undermines another is dependence on feelings over doing what's best for the child's long-range development: Mom might feel pity for the child Dad has punished. Or maybe she's just trying to induce cheap adoration from the child; it's easier to be adored when you're the "good guy."

Such emotional reactions, however, eventually turn you from a parent into a tool. Children rarely respect overindulgent parents. They become conditioned to offer superficial devotion only when your services are desired. That's the definition of a spoiled brat, and it's often catalyzed by a divided front.

Divided fronts teach kids that relationships are a tangle of recourses. They lead kids to look for cracks and loopholes. United fronts teach them that relationships require compromise and shared values, always with the best interests of others in mind.

To convince your wife to agree to a united front, I suggest sharing with her how it can strengthen your family. When spouses disagree on parenting decisions, it causes conflict, and constant conflict is cancerous to families. Divided fronts also encourage children to have tiered respect for parents, even to love one parent more than the other; imbalances of that nature are equally cancerous. They're not much different than when parents favor one child over the other.

The united front has power because it helps detoxify the family of conflict and imbalances, providing moms, dads, and kids with the emotional security that only a stable family can provide. Parents should make employing it among their highest priorities.
