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BEING PRUNED TO BECOME MORE FRUITFUL

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinedresser. Every branch in me that does not bear fruit he takes away, and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes, that it may bear more fruit." John 15:1-2

This month I'm sharing a devotion from my mom's favorite devotional book, "Streams in the Desert".

It is comforting to think of trouble, in whatever form it may come to, us, as a heavenly messenger, bringing us something from God. In its earthly aspect it may seem hurtful, even destructive; but in its spiritual outworking it yields blessing. Many of the richest blessings which have come down to us from the past are the fruit of sorrow or pain. We should never forget that redemption, the world's greatest blessing, is the fruit of the world's greatest sorrow. In every time of sharp pruning, when the knife is deep and the pain is sore, it is an unspeakable comfort to read, "My Father is the husbandman."

Doctor John Vincent, a Methodist Episcopal bishop of the late-nineteenth and early-twentieth centuries, and a leader of the Sunday school movement in Amer-

ica, once told of being in a great hothouse where luscious clusters of grapes were hanging on every side. The owner said, "When my new gardener came, he said he would have nothing to do with these vines unless he could cut them clean down to the stalk; and he did, and we had no grapes for two years, but this is the result."

There is rich suggestiveness in this interpretation of the pruning process, as we apply it to the Christian life. Pruning *seems* to be destroying the vine, the gardener *appears* to be cutting it all away; but he looks on into the future and knows that the final outcome will be the enrichment of the vine's life and greater abundance of fruit.

There are blessings we can never have unless we are ready to pay the price of pain. There is no way to reach them save through suffering.

"I walked a mile with Pleasure, She chattered all the way; But left me none the wiser For all she had to say.

When we first moved here I decided to plant some grapes in my back yard. I would do it differently if I were to plant them now but the point of this devotion /

newsletter article isn't about poor planning but about the value of pruning.

The first year I planted the grapes I just let them grow as they wished in order to let the roots get as established as much as they could.

The second year I let the vines grow without too much trimming but began to train up a main trunk and a couple of cordons (the "limbs" of the grape vine that would be supported by wire).

By the third year the vines were beginning to grow nicely so I decided to just let them do what they wanted to do. I thought it made sense for the plant to get as much foliage as possible because it was this that would really feed the plants.

By the fall of that year I realized that was a mistake. The vine that was on the very end of my row of grapes had grabbed hold of my neighbor's chokecherry tree and climbed to the top. When I pulled the vines out of

his tree, I stretched them across my yard and they were easily forty-feel long.

Although it's counter-intuitive, I've learned that, if I want a good yield of fruit, I must prune the vines regularly throughout the summer. I must trim off new grape clusters that the vine wants to put out throughout the summer and trim back the vines themselves so the

vine will put more energy into the fruit that I want to be able to pick for harvest.

Experiencing that, I can understand this devotion from "Streams in the Desert" much better. I had never really understood what Jesus meant when he said in John 15, "Every branch in me that does not bear fruit he takes away, and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes, that it may bear more fruit." It seemed like He was treating the vine that was bearing fruit just like the vine that didn't bear fruit. But now I know differently. A vine that is pruned and cared for produces much more fruit and is much healthier.

As we walk through life God "prunes" us by allowing us to experience the consequences of living in a broken and sinful world. As this happens we experience sadness and sorrow, pain and difficulty. But these are necessary for our health and vitality as children of God. We learn the priorities of life and experience the love of a Father who gives us hope in and through every circumstance of life.

And as we do this we are able to point others to our God who loves us so much. I'll see you in church.


Concordia Circle/LWML—

Getting to know our family—



Grace's September Spotlight focuses on Mel Clausen, a ninety-three old resident of Grace Assisted Living, who spent most of his adult work-life being a "change agent" for the Bureau of Land Management and quietly making a difference. Mel was born in Lindsey, Nebraska June of 1930, the fifth son of a Nebraska farmer and the first in his family to graduate high school. Grade school at that time consisted of first through eighth grades and was conducted in a one-room schoolhouse two miles from home. "By the fourth grade I knew all the information," shared Mel, "because I listened!" Because of WWII, Mel's two older brothers were sent to the Pacific front and Mel was forced to drop out of school for a year to help on the farm. After enlisting his pastor's help, the two were able to convince Mel's dad to allow him to attend high school rather than farm. This involved moving to town, finding housing, and earning an income to pay for room and board. The ever-observant Mel noticed that Roose-

velt's Civilian Conservation Corps had installed power lines along rural roads but farmhouses were still using oil lamps to provide light since there were no electrical lines from these utility poles to homes. With a desire to help others, Mel took this problem to an electrical company and was hired to install the lines. One and a half years later, Mel was a journeyman electrician, earning enough to pay his way to college. One semester into college the Korean War broke out and Mel was off to the front lines after volunteering for the Marines. Following his stent in the service, Mel finished his first year of college at Wayne State Teachers' College in Nebraska and then transferred to the University of Idaho in Moscow where he sought a degree in Forestry and Civil Engineering. It was during this time Mel met his wife Gert through a friend from Nebraska who was attending school in Moscow. Gert, also from Nebraska, married Mel October of 1956. Two years later Mel graduated college and took a job in Boise for a relatively new government agency, The Bureau of Land Management, where he designed logging roads. During his years with the BLM Mel worked in Alaska, the Pacific Northwest and California, traveling for the Forestry Division. It was during these travels, Mel observed large, expensive equipment (often duplicated) sitting idle, resulting in wasted taxpayer money. This prompted him to write a six-page letter that eventually reached the Secretary of Interior, who met with Mel and implemented his ideas to reuse equipment and to develop the Interagency Fire Center.

While serving as District Manager in northern California, Mel identified a 13-mile area of pristine BLM forested land, "A place where people could walk peacefully. Where animals could be seen." Thus, a proposal for preserving the area was submitted and accepted. Mel Clausen making another lasting contribution along life's journey.

Following his stay in California, he was sent to Colorado—Canyon City—as District Manager to take care of some issues there. After six years in Canyon City, Mel was again on the move to the big timber area of the Oregon Coast. Here he became involved with environmentalists in the spotted owl controversy. He convinced sceptics that these owls could live as well, if not better, in second growth timber as opposed to old growth timber. Researchers were convinced following nightly visits to second growth timber, because more hoots were heard here than in the old growth timber!! Mel retired from his District Manager position in 1988. He then became involved with some "genetic forestry guys" to develop *perfect* trees. These tree experts identified and marked trees that were exceptional specimens as to size, disease resistance etc. After identifying 50 such trees, cones from these trees were collected and "orchards" grown. These atypical trees, grown in their own "nursery", cross-pollinated thus producing **Super** trees which are today being planted all over the West.

Following this experience, Mel returned to Boise to enjoy a well-deserved retirement. By this time Mel was well known for his accomplishments in forestry and civil engineering as well as working with others to accomplish goals, so it was no surprise that Winthrop Rockefeller chose him to educate foreign students in Resource Management. Mel Clausen answered the call and headed to Pakistan to convince the Eastern mind of the benefits of working together, utilizing each person's expertise. For six weeks he worked in a hostile environment but to no avail. The Eastern mind could not grasp the concept of working together for the good of the whole.

These days Mel can be found in his room with a stack of books by his easy chair. His daughter keeps him well supplied from the local library. Sunday mornings Mel can be found attending Adult Bible Class and Divine Worship Service with his daughter and grandchildren.
